## **Retirements Lead to Changes** within Local 94 Executive Board

As an engineer, chief, union activist, picket captain, shop steward, trustee, business agent, treasurer, and vice president John Kramer set a standard of excellence and advocacy that will reverberate within IUOE Local 94 for decades.

John Kramer can rightfully be recognized as a Founding Father of today's Local. These are the men who walked the picket lines and fought to transform this union from "glorified porters" to cutting edge

It was under John Kramer's leadership that the Local 94 Scholarship Fund which began in 1996 by the awarding of two scholarships has gone on to presenting nearly \$1.2 million in scholarships to more than 160 sons and daughters of Local 94 members!

In recognition for a lifetime of service, the Local 94 Executive Board has voted to install John Kramer as the Vice President Emeritus.

Other Executive Board members who have also recently retired include former Financial Secretary Robert Zimmer and Trustee Gerard Streicher.

Those three retirements have resulted in a new look leadership and the addition of four new members to the Local 94 Executive Board. While we all know their faces, here's a little bit about the new members of the EB.

Vincent Curcio and Bill Caramico will serve as Trustees and Rocco Ferrigno and David Rodriguez have joined Anthony Fasulo as Auditors.

A Marine Corps veteran, Vincent Curcio began his Local 94 career as an engineer's helper for C&W at 1166 Sixth Avenue in 1986. During his engineering career he has at 60 Wall Street, where he rose to Assistant Chief; and has been a Chief at 100 Park Ave., 1330 Sixth Ave., and 730 Third Ave. He currently heads the engineering department at Crowne Plaza Hotel at 1605 Broadway.

In addition, Curcio has been a Curriculum Committee member since 2008 and an instructor at the Local 94 Training Fund since 2012 for the USGBC G-Pro O&M Course and the Unit 1 course.

Vincent is married to his wife June and they have five children and a Granddaughter.

Bill Caramico has been an active member of Local 94 for 33 years. A committed member of the Political Action Committee Fund, Bill stands alone as a member that collected more political action check-off cards then any member in Local 94's history. 



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# **Secure in Our Agreements; Fight Rages to Save Union Rights**

Dear Brothers and Sisters:

Despite all the disruptions created by snow, ice and freezing temperatures we were able to negotiate and ratify a new labor agreement with the Realty Advisory Board for Labor for our commercial members; the Department of Education and Local 891 for our school members.

And, while it took a bit longer, we were also able to negotiate a new contract for our six members employed by Covenant House.

While these agreements will assure labor peace and provide security for our members and our families, there is work to be done.

For us, that means to finally gain equal pay for equal work for our neatly 1,000 members classified as "indirect employees" by the Department of Education. This injustice which prevents us from negotiating directly with the Department of Education on behalf of those members must end. We made that clear in our contract negotiations.

Our agreement includes language to establish a joint committee to address this issue. Local 94 along with SEIU 32BJ and others recently testified before the City Council (see related story on page 5), to shed light on economic injustices our brothers and sisters working in our New York City schools live with every day.

Testifying at hearings is only a small step in our fight for a just wage. I assure you, Local 94 is prepared to meet with anyone, anywhere, anytime and do whatever it takes to make our members whole.

We can wage our fight with confidence because we have a strong union.

Unfortunately after more than 60 years of relentless state by state assaults on unions through the passage of right-to-work legislation have so impacted union membership that the ability of unions to collectively bargain may be lost forever.

How, you may ask, can having the right to work hurt the unions? Everyone should have the "right to work!"

Well everyone does have a right to work. But what "right to work" actually does is to permit employees in a union shop to enjoy all the benefits of the union contract without having to join the union, pay union dues or "agency fees."

The premise of the law is that paying dues or fees to the union is a violation of your First Amendment rights. That is how it is sold to the workers. "Free yourselves from the shackles of the union."

While selling that to workers, governors and legislators are running a race to the bottom in their attempts to attract new business and industry to their states with the promise of lower wages. The trend is spreading like wildfire in our nation's heartland.

It started in 2012 with Indiana Governor Mitch Daniels; less than a year later Michigan Gov. Rick Snyder pushed for, and signed right-to-work legislation. Not wanting to fall behind his neighboring states in lowering the cost of labor Gov. Scott Walker

of Wisconsin signed a right to work bill in March.

With his signature, Wisconsin became the 25th state to weaken union rights. And he will not be the last. The Senate in Kentucky and House in Missouri have already passed RTW laws in an effort to keep up in the race to the bottom.

And, who knows how deep that bottom runs. As the Chicago Tribune noted in a March 3d Editorial:

"A 2012 overview by the Congressional Research Service found that right-to-work states tend to have lower unionization rates, lower wages and greater job growth than "union security" states do... "What's unarguable is that laws crimping unions also reduce their memberships, revenues and political power.

"The Washington Post reported Monday that, in the four years since Wisconsin's controversial Act 10 reduced the collective bargaining rights of public employees, union rolls have plummeted: "The state branch of the National Education Association, once 100,000 strong, has seen its membership drop by a third. The American Federation of Teachers, which organized in the college system, saw a 50 percent decline. The 70,000-person membership in the state employees union has fallen by 70 percent."

So as we enjoy the wages, and benefits of our new agreements, we must remain

# Local 94 Directs Attention to Injustice of Indirect System to City Council

Local 94 Firemen and other custodial employees may have started the year with a new contract. However the new deal did nothing to resolve the prevailing wage issue affecting Local 94's more than 1,000 "indirect" employees within the Department of Education.

In a demonstration that the fight for the prevailing wage is far from over, Local 94 Business Manager Kuba Brown, along with Business Agents Jack Redden and Ray Macco led a delegation of Local 94 leaders and members to present our "equal pay" argument before the City Council Education Committee hearing on February 2.

Testifying on behalf of Local 94 Ray Macco cited the unjust wage gap that in some cases has Local 94's "indirect" employees earning \$22,500 a year less than "direct" DOE employees doing the same or lesser work. Macco also took the committee beyond the lighter paychecks.

The DOE is shortchanging the Local 94 Health, Pension and Training Funds. "Contributions to the Local 94 Health & Welfare Funds for indirect employees are \$5.15 per hour below the contributions to other engineers employed by NYC. So unlike all other NYC employees Local 94's indirect employees do not receive health benefits upon retirement," said Macco.

"Without those contributions Local 94 cannot afford to provide our members with healthcare benefits when they retire," Macco told the committee. Until informed of that inequity Councilmember Daniel Dromm, who chairs the Education Committee told Macco that neither he, nor other members of

the committee had any idea Local 94 members do not receive those same retirement health benefits as nearly all other retired city employees.

Dromm and others were further moved by the emotional personal accounts of Loca 94 Firemen Joseph Modica and Raymond Cerna. Modica, a Fireman at Grady High School in Brighton Beach could not have been more direct: "my job cost me my first marriage," he told the committee. "And, today working seven days a week is stealing precious days and hours I could spend with my wife, my sons and my daughter. And, that difference in wages, as well as health and welfare contributions impacts every decision that must be made from choosing and paying for college, to health care and retirement plans... the reality is I fear I am paying a heavy price for my financial decisions," an emotional Modica explained.

Cerna, who has worked at PS 11 in the Bronx for more than 23 years, told the committee that despite holding nearly a half-dozen licenses he earns \$7 an hour less than contract employees. "Here in New York, a city that prides itself on fairness and equality, thousands of school workers have been left behind in a two-tiered system. I cannot understand how this unjust system can be allowed to continue," Cerna asked.

Along with Local 94 the committee also heard testimony from representatives of Local 32BJ SEIU, IUOE Local 831 President Robert Troeller and Deputy Chancellor Elizabeth Rose, John Shea, Chief Executive of School Facilities and Renee Campion First Deputy Commissioner, NYC Office of Labor Relations.

While the hearing did nothing to resolve the inequities, it did provide a small window of hope. "Having an indirect system is not set in stone," Deputy Chancellor Stone told the committee. "(The DOE) is always interested in having the best system possible...we recognize the discrepancy, and are open to discussions with the three unions."

successful fight for prevailing wage rates for school workers in private contractor schools increasing member pay by over \$28,000. And, as recently as February, I testified before the City Council seeking payroll parity for all our other brothers and sisters within the Department of Education.

I have been involved in all contract negotiations for our Schools since 1999 and all Realty Advisory Board commercial building negotiations since 2004.

True to my belief in political action and community involvement, I helped to create and have been the Chairman of the Local 94 Political Action Committee and am proud that we have a Political Action Fund

(PAC). It is through the PAC that our voices are heard.

Remember, if you do not speak up, you cannot be heard.

Within the community, I have helped to organize our members in volunteer efforts including clean-up and environmental projects with the Boy Scouts on Staten Island; and assisting the White Roof Project, paint rooftops to help save energy costs.

In addition to my new Business Representative duties, I have been elected Financial Secretary, on the Local 94 Executive Board, and I will continue to serve as a Full Union Trustee on all Local 94 Benefit (Health, Annuity and Training) Funds.

## Local 94 Crews Help Midtown Towers Capture BOMA Pinnacle Awards

Renowned in the industry as "the true measure of what it takes to run a building" BOMA's Pinnacle Awards are commercial building Oscar's. The gold topped crystal awards are presented in recognition of both individual and team achievement.

Presented each February, each of the New York City winners are automatically nominated into the regional event which could eventually lead to the national TOBY (The Outstanding Building of the Year) Award. Among this year's winners are a pair of Local 94-operated buildings located in the heart of midtown.

452 Fifth Avenue was presented with the Renovated Building Award; and 340 Madison Avenue was recognized for Outstanding Office Building Operations (500,000 – 1,000,000 sq. ft.).

"This is really quite an honor," said 340 Madison Avenue Chief Engineer John Hatton. "We are especially proud to have been recognized for esthetics as well as efficiencies."

But don't expect Hatton and his crew of John Giordano, Visar Bellcishta, Dennis Lawler, Mynor Escobar and Richie Sheil to rest on their laurels. Having already earned an Energy Star score of 93; the team is seeking even greater fuel and electricity savings.

By installing isolation valves and creating four separate zones, Hatton's crew has reduced their fuel consumption by some 35% over the past three years. "And, that

was after switching from # 6 to # 2 fuel," said Hatton.

Always with an eye on reducing electricity, a state-of-art electric monitoring system will soon be up and running. "In the last year alone we have reduced our usage by 713 KW hours, we expect to do even better in 2015," said Hatton. "The more feedback we have, the more we can modify our usage."

There is also a great sense of pride and accomplishment at 452 Fifth Avenue where the BOMA award is prominently displayed in the lobby. Actually 452 is a configuration of three buildings, the landmarked Beaux Arts Knox Building; a onetime Kress Department store and a 30-story glass and steel tower built in the early 1980's.

Once the exclusive home to HSBC

Bank, the building was sold in 2010 and transformed into a multi-tenant structure managed by CBRE. Along with the transformation, CBRE brought in a new crew under the direction of Chief Engineer John Paluch

So even as new generators, hi-rise elevators, cooling towers and risers, a new BMS and steam controls, were installed along with other renovations, Paluch's team of Paul Krische, Edward Luciano, Albert Mutis, Christopher Viviani, Inocencio Arroyo, James Haberman, Bill Ott and Nelson Velasquez ensured a seamless transition.

"Our guys were the meat-and-potatoes that ensured all the improvements being made came to fruition," Paluch explained. "Our team oversees and ensures everything that is done and is done appropriately."

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# **A Heartfelt Thank You & Reminders** on Conduct and Responsibilities

What can I say? It has been a roller coaster ride this past year. With the retirements of both Thomas Costello and John Kramer, my support structure has taken quite a hit. Both have been instrumental in my career.

My first encounter with John Kramer was more than 30 years ago. He was the Chief Engineer at 875 Third Avenue and I was a Porter. It was John who led me into Local 94 and for that, I am truly grateful. So without getting too sentimental, I want to take this opportunity to say thank you.

Thank you, John for all your years of service, support and fine leadership. You are the best!

Now let's focus on uptown business. We have recently had to address a spate of disciplinary issues ranging from write-ups to potential terminations. Nearly all could have been avoided. Remember the technology we use to our advantage, can also provide the evidence of inappropriate behavior.

For example, card swipes will register and track your time and whereabouts in your buildings. The log book can be used as a legal document against you. Modern cameras, now, not only provide visual evidence but audio evidence as well. So we should all be aware of our surroundings and keep in mind that we are being watched and can be heard.

Technology is also providing new challenges for engineers. To protect our craft we must acquire new skills that will allow our local to grow. It is through knowledge that we enhance our value to our Local and to management. At the very least, be aware the following skills are mandatory for an Engineer, Mechanic and Helper:

Package units and chillers: Engineers should be able to charge, recover, evacuate systems and perform basic electrical troubleshooting skills. They should know the

pump down cycle and be able to explain Air-Conditioning, Refrigeration and Freezer

Plumbing: Engineers should be able to braze, solder, cut, thread, and assemble piping. They should be knowledgeable on steam traps, standpipes, sprinklers, preaction, dry sprinkler and deluge type. They should be able to repair flushometers, faucets, and toilets plus drain waste and vent systems. Don't forget your leader plumbing systems for storm drains.

HVAC: Engineers should understand the proper working order of constant air volume systems, variable air volume systems, dual duct systems, air dampers, preheat, reheat, induction units, chiller water

coils and air balancing; pneumatics and direct digital control.

Electrical: Engineers should have a complete understanding how basic electrical switches work, single pole, double pole, three way and four way switch operation. They should be able to understand ballasts, emergency lighting, emergency generators, UPS, ATS, and battery stations.

The Chief Engineer must provide time to train their staff in all these categories. The Local 94 Training Fund provides a solid foundation, but it must be strengthened with on-the-job training.

Remember: the more we improve our skills the greater the demand will be for our

## **Local 94 Team Captain Helps** to Bring Airbnb **Fight to Albany**

When Juan Rosas says he's the type of guy who likes to get involved and help the Union it's not idle talk. So when the Hotel Trades Council wanted to deliver a message to Albany that Airbnb and other online room and apartment rental services aren't such a good deal for New Yorkers, Rosas made sure he was on the bus.

"No one has an issue with someone in a single family, or two-family house renting out a room to tourists to make a few extra dollars," said Rosas. "We want Albany to understand it becomes an issue when big time owners of apartment buildings leave apartments or entire buildings vacant and turn them into illegal hotels."

That is why Rosas, a Local 94 Maintenance Mechanic and Engineering Team Captain at the Peninsula Hotel added his voice to those of 200 other union members and community activists who made the mid-March journey to Albany. And, according to Rosas, it was a message that needed to be told among the state senators and assembly members they met.

"It was pretty interesting to walk through the Capitol and sit in the offices of state senators and assembly members and explain the impact of these online rental services. Not only are they losing tax revenue, there are other issues as well. We are also losing affordable housing, and it can be dangerous," said Rosas.

When Local 94 Training Fund initiated the College Degree Program 10 years ago goals were simple. Local 94 wanted to provide an opportunity for skilled and motivated engineers to earn a degree to enhance their career opportunities.

There are hundreds of Local 94 members who have unrivaled engine room experience and skills, but find themselves unable to advance for the lack of a college degree. Through the courses offered through the CUNY Murphy Institute, the New York City College of Technology, the members of Local 94 have been able to incorporate academics into their technical skills.

It took Lennox Edwards six years of study, but in 2012 Edwards, the Chief Engineer at Covenant House, became the first member of Local 94 to earn a Bachelor's degree under the program. Over the past couple of years Ralph Rispoli earned his Associate Degree in Environmental Control Technology; Brent McCoy acquired a Baccalaureate Degree in Facilities Management; and Property Manager/Chief Engineer/Instructor Lawrence Spahn managed to acquire a Baccalaureate in Facilities Management.

Joining that group representing the Class of '15 is Luis l. Rivas, who will graduate with his Baccalaureate Degree this spring. On behalf of everyone at the Training Center, we say congratulations Luis. And, congratulations to all of our graduates, you have made us proud.

For those who may be interested



in pursuing a degree, there are some attractive incentives:

- ▶ Under the program members of Local 94 who complete the core training program, the Energy Conservation Course and the Mechanical Drawing Course can be awarded 15 credits toward an Associate in Applied Science (AAS) degree in Environmental Control Technology from NYCCT;
- ▶ Credits from the AAS Degree can then be applied to Bachelor of Technology degree in Facilities Management;
- ▶ Local 94 students are eligible for a tuition reimbursement for up to 30 credits upon completion of the Associate in Environmental Control Technology or Bachelor of Technology in Facilities Management programs.




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
